) Days on the South /est Slopes



"The beautiful scenery was well vorth the extra effort to get up ome of the climbs (in particular the Lanowindra to Crookwell section). With warm dry days the cycling was very pleasant and freezing nights making us head off to bed soon after dark. At Crookwell the overnight temperature dropped to -6 C and a nuge frost heralded the new day.

Many of us have heard a cyclist recount how a Big Ride changed their life. Muggaccinos has conducted a testing 100km ride every Sunday since the mid-90s and blames its origins on the 1996 "Albury to Bathurst Big Ride".

BNSW's latest BUG evolved from withdrawal symptoms after 8 glorious days cycling 615km from the border town of Albury due north to the central west. Whereupon four nurses from Royal North Shore hospital, and a few friends, suffered post-Big Ride withdrawal symptoms. Their remedy was to congregate early on Sunday morning at Turramurra to ride NW towards Galston, Mt White, Gosford and Wyong to favourite "Nosh Stops" where they enjoyed a caffeine fix.

10 years latter the rides programme is over 30 different 100km+ rides visiting Wyee, Spencer, Windsor, Kurrajong, Picton, Otford, Austinmer and Wollongong and many more cafes in between (www.Muggaccinos.com). Experienced cyclists are welcome. A triple chain-ring helps because their First Commandment is: "Hills are your friends!"
